Festivals and Celebrations

Social Etiquette and Behavior

- **Respecting elders**, maintaining a **polite demeanor**, and avoiding direct confrontation are important ٠ values in Taiwanese society.
- Place your **chopsticks** together on the table, or the chopsticks rest when finished. Never stick ٠ your chopsticks vertically into a bowl.
- **Toasting** is common and is often made before and during meals ["乾杯" (gānbēi), meaning "cheers].



Language and Communication

- Mandarin Chinese is the official language in Taiwan.
- While English is taught, it's less commonly spoken in everyday situations compared to India.
- Learning Mandarin can help you navigate daily life and academic settings.

Language Learning Experiences

Learning Mandarin can be challenging for Indian students, as the language is significantly different from your native language. The pronunciation, tones, and writing system present a unique learning curve.

The complexity of Mandarin characters and tones can make it difficult for international students to achieve fluency. It's important to persevere and practice regularly.



Language Learning Apps

Utilize apps like Duolingo, HelloChinese, or Rosetta Stone. Practice speaking Mandarin daily, even if it's just basic phrases and greetings.

Language Exchange

Partner with a local student who wants to improve their English or another language you speak.

Feedback and Practice

Regularly ask for feedback from native speakers on your language use and pronunciation.



Food Challenges in Taiwan

Taiwanese cuisine can be both exciting and challenging for Indian students.

The flavors and ingredients are quite different from Indian cuisine, which is rich in spices and mostly vegetarian.

Taiwanese cuisine includes a lot of seafood, pork, and rice-based dishes. Vegetarian options are available but less varied compared to India. Food tends to be less spicy, and dairy products are less common.

Adjusting to the local palate and finding familiar food options can be difficult at first.

Ways to overcome these challenges

- **Learning to cook** simple Indian dishes at home can be helpful.
- Visiting Indian grocery stores will help find essential ingredients for Indian cooking.
- Experimenting with fusing Indian flavors with Taiwanese ingredients can create unique, enjoyable meals.

Learn phrases like "I'm a vegetarian" (我是素食者 [Wǒ shì sùshí zhě]) or "No meat, please" (請不要加肉 [Qǐng bùyào jiā ròu]) can be very helpful.








Reading and understanding rental contracts written in Mandarin can be challenging, leading to potential misunderstandings or unfavorable
